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### I Indigenous Reciprocity Initiative of the Americas (IRI)


Since IRI launched in April of 2021, the program has raised over \$288,000 to support community-led, grassroots projects designed and implemented by local peoples fighting for land, water, food, medicine and cultural sovereignty. These funds are equally-distributed to our network of local partners representing Indigenous groups who all have full control over the use and management of their resources. IRI recognizes that traditional knowledge cannot thrive without material resources and that the struggle for autonomy and sovereignty is fundamental to the protection of plant medicines. In 2024, IRI achieved a record-breaking milestone, raising an unprecedented \$118,838 in donations.

### II Chacruna Chronicles

Chacruna Chronicles, one of our leading content outlets, published 39 original, high-quality articles from experts and researchers across the field. These articles were made freely available on our website and widely shared across our social media channels and newsletters. In 2024, the main topics explored were <u>culture</u>, <u>policy</u>, <u>sex & power</u>, <u>queer issues</u>, <u>inclusion & diversity</u>, <u>music</u>, <u>integration</u>, <u>science</u>, <u>spirituality</u>, <u>news and academic research</u>.


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### **Chacruna Book Publications**

### IV Chacruna Courses

In 2024, we held **7 multi-class courses** featuring **48 highly qualified teachers**, awarded 242 scholarships to people from underserved and underrepresented communities, and had a total of 129 students enrolled. We had an incredibly diverse cohort of students from different ethnicities, countries, professions, and ages. Students came from a variety of professional backgrounds, including therapists, psychologists, academics, artists, and more:



#### Diversity, Culture and Social Justice in Psychedelics (Jan 8th - March 25th)

- We had a total of 12 students
- Of those students, 9 registered with scholarships

#### Ayahuasca Healing, Science and Indigenous Knowledge (April 1st - July 8th)

- We had a total of 21 students
- Of those students, 17 registered with scholarships

 3 students submitted final projects, consisting of papers and internal reflections



#### The Science of Psychedelic Healing (April 23rd - June 25th)

- We had a total of 17 students
- Of those students, 12 registered with scholarships

#### Highlights of the course:

 6 students submitted final projects, consisting of internal reflections, an art project and papers



Roots of Psychedelic Therapy: Shamanism, Ritual and Traditional Uses of Sacred Plants (July 2nd - Oct 15th)

- We had a total of 17 students
- Of those students, 17 registered with scholarships

#### Highlights of the course:

- 8 students submitted final projects, consisting of one art project - a painting, internal reflections and papers
- CEs awarded to 4 students



#### Queering Psychedelics: Intersectionality, Healing, Spirituality and Liberation (July 15th Sept 23rd)

- Of those students, 16 registered with scholarships

#### Foundations of Plant Medicine Facilitation, Integration and Ethics

(Sept 30th - Dec 16th)

- We had a total of 35 students
- Of those students, 27 registered with scholarships
- CEs awarded to 1 student

### V Chacruna Workshops

In 2024, we held **6 workshops** featuring **11 highly qualified teachers and experts**, awarded **79 scholarships**, and had a total of **64 students enrolled**.



### VI Community Forums

Community Forums play a crucial role in advancing high-quality public education on psychedelics. In an increasingly crowded market often marked by superficial content, Chacruna stands out by providing meaningful knowledge, well-researched information and comprehensive educational experiences. In 2024, we organized and hosted **24 online** <u>community forums</u> with leading experts and specialists in the field, covering highly relevant and important topics such as diversity, inclusion, sex & gender, culture, identity, social justice, law, policy, Indigenous knowledge, religion, philosophy, intersectionality, environmental justice, and more. **78 speakers** participated in these virtual panels, with our **top 5 forums** being:

### VII **University Collaborations**

Chacruna is excited to continue and expand its university collaborations, having built on successful partnerships throughout 2024 which have been established over the past few years. We were proud to launch a Chacruna University Deck for the purpose of collaborating with other educational institutions, which includes sponsorships, partnerships, courses, lectures, community forums, chronicles, books, special journal editions, grant projects, vending, outreach support, internships, mentorships and consultations. ### VIII Participation and Tabling at Conferences and Events

As psychedelic conferences become increasingly mainstream and corporate, we find it crucial to provide perspectives which educate the public on the roots of psychedelic plant medicines, Indigenous reciprocity, right relationship, and many other topics which strive to decolonize psychedelics. In many instances, we have been one of the very few organizations at these large conferences providing this essential lens, a perspective that has been met with widespread gratitude from attendees. ### **Chacruna In-Person Community Dialogues**

Chacruna In-Person Community Dialogues feature panels, film screenings, and rapé circles and take place around the U.S. While our virtual forums are able to reach global audiences, these in-person events provide a vital space for networking, bonding, and learning. They foster meaningful connections in communities where psychedelic research is most prominent. In 2024 Chacruna held the following Community Dialogue:



#### Psychedelic Network Summit with the Chacruna Institute

### Annual Conference: Chacruna's Psychedelic Culture 2024 Conference

This two day in-person conference, with 3 simultaneous tracks, continued our tradition of exploring cutting-edge themes that are largely absent from the mainstream psychedelic conversation, and which are related to our main initiatives: Indigenous Reciprocity & Decolonial Dialogues, Psychedelic Justice, Protection of Sacred Plants & Cultural Traditions, and voices from the Global South.

- 446 attendees
- 120 scholarships awarded
- 87 speakers
- 30 sessions including panels, interactive breakout rooms, meetup sessions, and musical performances
- 16 Chacruna team members were present from around the globe
- 39 sponsors
- 6 media partners
- 18 community partners
- 23 volunteers

Several of them were made publicly available to mark special holidays. All videos were made freely available in March on the <u>Chacruna YouTube channel</u>.

### XI **Fundraising Events**

This hybrid online/in-person event, along with other fundraising campaigns, provided an opportunity to raise awareness about Chacruna's mission and raise funds to support the work that we do. Topics covered included psychedelic research in South and Central America, cultural traditions, re-Indigenization, female empowerment, and more.

This year, Chacruna Latinoamérica released 3 newsletters in both Portuguese and Spanish and prepared an End-of-Year Newsletter highlighting the most significant achievements of 2024. Our current audience has grown to 8,047 contacts, with 7,652 subscribers.



Social media goals achieved:

• We are delighted to report that Chacruna Latinoamerica has significantly expanded its audience with a notable increase of 1503 followers. We ended the year with **8.26k Instagram followers**, showcasing substantial growth.

### XIII

### **Council for the Protection of Sacred Plants**

In 2024, the Council for the Protection of Sacred Plants (CPSP) continued its process of inquiry, consultation and activism. There was a big focus on the initiatives taking place in Oregon and Colorado, and issues around the country concerning religious freedom. Chacruna accomplished:





6 court case consultations involving arrests, court cases, seizures, and organization structure to enhance health, safety, ethics, and legal defense, including:

- Advised and consulted with women arrested in a North Carolina ayahuasca case
- Advised and consulted with lawyers involved in an Arizona ayahuasca/ coca case
- Advised and consulted with lawyers in a Florida Sacred Sanctuary ayahuasca raid
- Advised and consulted in an Indiana avahuasca case
- Advised and consulted on an ayahuasca arrest and seizure in New York
- Consulted with a lawyer representing the Begley family in Soul Quest wrongful death suit and produced a public presentation on the case
- Advised numerous groups on their religious and legal structure and viability

#### Sacred Plant Alliance (SPA)

 Chacruna served as a fiscal sponsor of Sacred Plant Alliance (SPA) and published an article with them titled The Mission and Programs of Sacred Plant Alliance.



#### Sacred Sanctuary Florida Raids

• In early December 2024, federal and state law enforcement raided a Florida ayahuasca church, Sacred Sanctuary, detaining church leadership and staff prior to the start of an ayahuasca retreat. Federal DEA officials, displaying agency credentials on their jackets, were present as were SWAT team members. Roughly 40 law enforcement officials were present at the raid which was authorized by a search warrant. The church was likely infiltrated by an undercover officer posing as a retreat participant. No one was charged with a crime at that time and the people detained were released the same day. Church leaders retained counsel familiar with RFRA and intend to defend their religious freedom. This is the first time since 1999 that DEA has attended a raid under a federal warrant and marks an important moment in which DEA has decided to attempt to enforce the Controlled Substances Act on a religious adherent.

#### Alaska Entheogenic Access Council (AKEAC)

 Chacruna supported the Alaska Entheogenic Access Council (AKEAC) and its founders in the creation of a Natural Medicine Alaska campaign, to legalize/ decriminalize natural medicines and design a regulated access program to reflect the needs of Alaska's citizens, with particular attention to the needs of Indigenous and native populations and veterans.

### **Racial Equity and Access (REA) Committee**

This committee is a branch of the Chacruna Institute for Psychedelic Plant Medicines, dedicated to ensuring that traditionally marginalized racial, ethnic, and Indigenous communities have access to healing medicines and are actively involved in the field of psychedelic studies at all levels. We believe it is essential to create resources that support and inform both those within these communities and the broader public, practicing activism within this space to foster an equitable and just psychedelic future.


We hosted a BIPOC Meetup session at the Psychedelic Culture conference, which was led by Dr. Darron T. Smith and Dr. Joseph McCowan.

We created a special issue on <u>Power, Discrimination and Privilege in</u> <u>Individuals and Institutions</u> for the peer-reviewed journal Frontiers in Psychology. The Research Topic contains 20 articles that cover a range of critical issues in Psychology (Personality and Social, Forensic and Legal, Cultural, and Gender, Sex and Sexualities) and Sociology (Race and Ethnicity, and Gender, Sex and Sexualities). These articles originate with researchers from countries including Germany, China, Singapore, Romania, the USA, and Canada. The researchers submitting these articles identify with a range of ethnicities, including Roma, Indigenous Australian, African American, Mexican American, Southeast Asian, Jewish Canadian, and Black German, to name a few.

### Women, Gender Diversity, and Sexual Minorities Working Group

The Women, Gender Diversity, and Sexual Minorities Working Group is an initiative of the Chacruna Institute focused on promoting accessibility and diversity in psychedelic science, practice, and discourse. It works to challenge and dismantle sexist, heteronormative, transphobic, and homophobic forms of oppression while allying with other underrepresented communities to combat harmful practices within psychedelic communities and science. ## XVI Ayahuasca Community Committee

The Ayahuasca Community Committee, a program of the Chacruna Institute for Psychedelic Plant Medicines, is composed of researchers and activists with extensive field experience. Our mission is to serve and support the ayahuasca community as it gains global prominence. We foster communication across diverse cultural contexts, promoting community safeguarding, healing, and dialogue. Our goal is to raise awareness and encourage positive action through collaborative research and cross-cultural community engagement. In 2024, we continued to produce vital research and facilitate in-depth dialogues, including:

We published 3 articles relating to ayahuasca in different contexts, such as law and policy, culture, conferences/events, science, research, and more:

### **Chacruna Media**

We published 2 press releases.

We created **73 newsletters** for an audience of **18,452 contacts**, including **13,226 subscribers**.

We had a total of **83 event sponsorships**.

We have built and maintained **community partnerships with 93 organizations**, non-profits, foundations, businesses, and institutions.

We uploaded **29 videos** onto our <u>YouTube page</u>, including exclusive Chacruna panels.

In the past year, we have expanded our social media presence, reaching 55.6k Instagram followers (a 13.4% increase), 7.69k YouTube subscribers (a 7.85% increase), 49k Facebook followers, and 46k Facebook likes. On Twitter, we gained 12.4k followers (a 2.4% increase), while on TikTok, we grew to 516 followers and uploaded 42 videos.

We had **21 media appearances** over the year, including in publications The Guardian, Bloomberg Law, Folha de São Paulo, Dr. Bronners, and many more.
